Donation Explanations and Opportunities

It's charitable donation time for end-of-the-year tax deductions, and I hope you are considering a gift to the national AAUW Fund campaign. This fund advances AAUW's mission by sustaining many vital programs and activities that respond to and help eradicate the persistent challenges facing women and girls.

The ever-changing names and descriptions of the money collected by the AAUW national office confuse many of us. The new name is easy to remember—The AAUW Fund—as is the new slogan: One AAUW—One Mission—One Fund.

From now on, when you donate to the AAUW Fund, you need to specify whether your donation may be used where it is needed most (unrestricted) or whether you prefer to enhance a specific program (restricted).

Here are some popular choices for restricted donating:

- > <u>Legal Advocacy Fund</u> (# 3999)—for legal case support and campus outreach grants;
- ➤ Educational Opportunities Fund (#4336)—for Fellowships, Grants and Tech Trek across the U.S. (excluding California Tech Trek);
- ➤ Eleanor Roosevelt Fund (#9170)—for conducting research and publishing reports detailing subjects such as the pay gap, sexual harassment at school, and the under-representation of women in STEM careers:
- ➤ <u>Leadership Programs Fund</u> (#4339)—for supporting the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders, Start Smart salary negotiation workshops, and Elect Her—Campus Women Win;
- ➤ <u>Public Policy Fund</u> (#4337)—for supporting government relations, civic engagement, and field organizing.

REDUCE What Comes IN

Pay bills online (bonus: no paper to file!)

Use your Smart phone apps for shopping lists, to-do lists, etc. (e.g., www.groceryiq.com lets you synchronize lists and get coupons).

Don't impulse-buy. Always make a list and keep to it.

RE-USE What You Don't Need

Increase your good karma and donate to a local charity. GOLDEN RULE: "If you wouldn't offer it to a friend, it isn't fit to donate." Follow IRS Guidelines for your deduction and take pics for your records.

For larger items, Freecycle is an easy way to list things. The recipient just comes and picks them up (no money changes hands; you just leave items outside for pick-up).

Re-Cycle What You Can

Waste Management Companies and Counties have resources; check their websites. Contra Costa's is www.co.contra-costa.ca.us/depart/cd/recycle/

Use California Approved e-Waste Collectors. For example, www.eWasteDirect.com.

De-Cluttering Tips

Set reasonable goals—one cupboard at a time.

Use a timer so you don't wander down memory lane.

Have an accountability partner.

Ask for help when you need it.

Be ruthless! If you haven't used it, you don't need it. Is it helpful to YOU (does it support your life right now)? Just because it was expensive, or someone gave it to you, doesn't mean you have to keep it.

Safety Tips

Protect your identity: Shred anything with info like account numbers. Call www.shredthisllc.com to reduce backlog, then use your own shredder daily (and oil it).

Don't hire help you don't know and trust.

When selling, don't give too much information to potential buyers.

Change passwords. Don't use the same one for multiple sites and no pet names or birthdays.

Back up your computer. A remote service can be very inexpensive (e.g., Carbonite is only \$59 per year).

Could neighbors find your emergency contact info in a hurry? Put ICE in your phone and address book and on the door to your fridge.

Public Policy



An important aspect of AAUW is supporting legislation that positively supports women and girls. AAUW CA developed Public Policy priorities to focus on during the next two years. Members are invited to comment on and support these initiatives. Below are the AAUW CA Public Policy priorities for 2015–2017. If you are interested in following progress on these initiatives, please go to the AAUW CA website (www.aauw-ca.org) and click on the Public Policy link.

AAUW CA Public Policy Action Priorities, 2015–2017

The AAUW CA Public Policy program supports its mission to advance equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research, and complements the national Public Policy program.

AAUWCA's priorities for action are chosen according to the criteria of viability, critical need, and strong member support. All members were invited to comment regarding which priorities affecting women and girls AAUW CA should emphasize on legislation during the next two years, and these priorities reflect member comments.

1. To achieve economic self-sufficiency for all women, AAUW CA supports:

- Pay equity, fairness in compensation, and economic justice;
- Equitable access and advancement in employment, including vigorous enforcement of employment antidiscrimination statutes:
- Strengthening retirement benefits and programs, including pension improvements and protecting Social Security from privatization or reduction in benefits:
- Programs that provide women with education, training, and support for success in the workforce;
- Strengthening programs, including welfare and career and technical education, to improve postsecondary education access, career development, and earning potential; and

 Greater availability of and access to a high standard of benefits and policies that promote work-life balance.

2. To support a strong system of high quality public education, AAUW CA advocates:

- Adequate and equitable funding for high quality public education for all students;
- Increased support for programs that break through barriers for women and girls in science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) fields;
- Protection of programs that meet the needs of girls and women in all levels of education, including vigorous enforcement of Title IX and all other civil rights laws pertaining to education;
- Opposition to the use of public funds for nonpublic elementary and secondary education and for charter schools that do not adhere to the same civil rights and accountability standards as required of public schools; and,
- Support and adequate funding for women's and disadvantaged populations' access to higher education, including two-year degree programs.

3. To guarantee equality, individual rights, and social justice for a diverse society, AAUW CA supports:

- Choice in the determination of one's reproductive life:
- Freedom from violence and fear of violence, including bullying and sexual harassment, in homes, schools, workplaces, communities, and the military;
- Increased access to quality, affordable health care and family planning services, including expansion of patient rights;
- Strengthening California programs that improve the lives of children in families living at or below the poverty level;
- Strengthening United Nations programs that address human rights as well as women's and girls' concerns;
- Freedom in definition of family and guarantee of civil rights in all family structures; and
- Vigorous protection of and full access to civil and constitutional rights.

Approved by a vote of the membership in May 2015.


