Understanding the SARS-COV2 Vaccines Featuring Bradley C. Hyman, Ph.D.



Bradley C. Hyman, Ph.D., recently retired from UC Riverside after almost 40 years as a professor of Genetics and Molecular Biology. He is a scientist in the strictest sense of the word. He has done research and published papers on several topics with a special focus on the duplication and evolution of mitochondrial DNA, a small genome instrumental in energy production. He has held leadership positions at the university and received numerous awards for his work. In retirement, he is continuing to educate people about science.

A long-time friend of our own Millie Kessler, he has agreed to speak with us about the science behind the two available vaccines produced by Pfizer/BioNTech and Moderna, as well as new vaccines in the pipeline. Dr. Hyman is hopeful such information may be useful in better understanding our options. He is not a physician and, appropriately, will not offer medical advice.

Do you have questions about the vaccines such as:

- Why are they safe?
- Did Operation Warp Speed cut corners?
- How was the technology developed so rapidly?
- What side effects might I anticipate?
- Will the vaccine change my DNA?
- Can I infect others after getting the vaccine?
- Are there differences between the available and soon-to-be available vaccines?

Tech Trek Update

Tech Trek remains a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) camp designed to develop interest, excitement, and self-confidence in young women who will enter 8th grade in the fall; however, this year it will be a virtual camp.

The 2021 Virtual Camp website was launched in January and the link to it is https://www.aauw-ca.org/2021-virtual-tech-trek-internal/. The website features camp details and exciting testimonials from participants in last year's pilot virtual program. The 5-day camp will be on-line this summer but include several hands-on activities with materials distributed before camp. An especially exciting feature will be the involvement of many past Tech Trek campers as near-peer coaches in the small group break-out rooms. It will be a great learning experience for the Tech

Trek alumnae and will promote camaraderie with this year's campers.

Selection of our six 2021 Tech Trek campers is expected to begin this month. In these especially difficult times for students and teachers, we are trying to make the process simpler, on-line and less stressful, while being mindful of state and national guidelines. The STEM teachers at the four San Ramon middle schools will be enlisted to nominate 7th grade girls who are excited by math or science, display curiosity and creativity, and are likely to benefit from the exposure to STEM and role models that Tech Trek Camp provides.

AAUW Supports Retirement Security

AAUW takes a position on topics relevant to the economic security for women. This article presents an overview on retirement security.

The Social Security system is more than just a retirement program. It is one of the most successful anti-poverty programs in our nation's history. It provides benefits to children, disabled workers, surviving spouses, and retirees.

The Gender Gap and Retirement

Women who work full time earn 82 cents on average for every dollar men earn. This gap is found throughout the economy, even when controlling for factors known to affect earnings such as education and training, parenthood, and hours worked. College-educated women still earn 7% less than men one year out of college, even when they have the same major and occupation as their male counterparts.

Continuing pay inequity results in women having fewer savings, lower Social Security benefits, and lower (if any) pension benefits, leaving them on an unequal retirement footing.

Retirement Insecurity

Women's retirement insecurity is in part because many women do not have private savings to rely on. Among workers participating in an employment-based retirement plan in 2010, female wage and salary workers ages 21–64 participated in a retirement plan at a lower level than males did, and only half of all workers participated in a private plan.

Many women work in industries or occupations that do not offer 401(k)s or other defined contribution plans. For example, women are twice as likely to work on a part-time basis as men. Currently, the Social Security benefit formula cannot make up for the substantial amount of time some women are out of the workforce or the fact that women are unlikely to be able to make pension or retirement savings investments during their displacement.

Social Security

Because women live longer, they depend on Social Security's guaranteed, inflation-adjusted lifetime benefits for more years than do men:

- Social Security supports millions of older women—more than half would fall into poverty without these benefits.
- 48% of all non-married (divorced, widowed, or never married) women age 65 and older get 90% or more of their income from Social Security.
- In 2008, 23% of women over the age of 65 relied on Social Security for all of their income.

Yet Social Security is not perfect. Women still bear a disproportionate burden of caregiving responsibilities, which can take them out of the paid workforce to care for children and aging parents.

Improving Retirement Security For Women

Many women cobble together retirement benefits from a number of sources, and even then are left to rely on the benefits of their spouse or other public assistance programs—or live in poverty.

Although Social Security needs reform, the system is not broken. The most recent Social Security trustees' report shows that the system can pay all scheduled benefits through 2033.

One possible reform to strengthen the system is lifting the payroll tax cap, putting the wealthiest Americans on equal footing with everyone else. The Chief Actuary of the Social Security Administration has projected that applying the payroll tax to income above \$250,000 will extend the full solvency of Social Security for the next 75 years, protecting the benefits of millions of Americans.

Another potential reform is a caregiver credit, which would give Social Security credits to men and women who step away from paid work to provide family care. This would help alleviate the resulting shortfall in Social Security benefits.

Membership Matters

Our San Ramon branch has grown to 108 members as of February 2021. Our dedicated membership is continuing to be active by Zoom during these COVID-19 stay-athome days. National Dues Increase

At its October 16, 2020 meeting, the AAUW Board of Directors voted to increase Individual Member dues for the next three years. The dues will rise by \$3 for Fiscal Year (FY) 2022, \$5 for FY 2023, and \$5 for FY 2024, making the total dues amount for those years \$62, \$67, and \$72, respectively. All but \$3 of your annual dues remains tax deductible.

This decision wasn't made lightly. The board members couldn't be more grateful for our members—or prouder of the work you've done this year. We also recognize that all of us are navigating numerous challenges in these uncertain times. However, in order to preserve the viability of this organization we all love, the board needed to take action. Simply put, this measure is essential for AAUW to continue our mission to achieve gender equity.

Current life members will not be affected by this change. New life memberships acquired after July 1, 2021 will reflect the higher dues' amounts. College and university membership fees will remain unchanged. (aauw.org)

AAUW Board of Directors Statement on Open Membership

The AAUW National Board of Directors strongly supports elimination of the degree requirement for membership and will put the requirement up for a membership vote this spring. This important change is a critical step in bringing AAUW's bylaws and membership requirement in line with our mission of advancing equity for women and girls. While AAUW is fiercely committed to educational attainment for all women, given our commitment to inclusion, this is simply the right thing to do.

Proposals to eliminate the degree requirement for membership have come before the membership for vote a number of times. The board feels very strongly that, while the degree requirement made perfect sense at AAUW's inception, this requirement is now counter to our mission and limits our ability to build the capacity needed to increase our impact as an organization.

Members can comment on the proposed amendment from January 11 through February 5, 2021, 5:00 PM ET. Voting will open on April 7 and close May 17, 2021, 5:00 PM ET.

We encourage respectful debate, which has always been a hallmark of the AAUW community. Please send any <u>comments</u> to let the board know of your thoughts on this proposal and exercise your vote this spring. (aauw.org)

Nancy Vandell

<u>Birthplace and other places I've lived</u>: I was born and raised in Corvallis, Oregon, with short sabbaticals in Palo Alto, Princeton, and St. Paul. As an adult, I have lived in the Bay Area and Houston.

Education: I have a bachelor's degree in Electrical & Computer Engineering from Oregon State University. I have also taken some graduate coursework in special education assessment and law.

Spouse: My husband of 36 years, Clark, is a retired geophysicist who enjoys travel, hiking, biking, reading, continuing education, and me ©.

<u>Children</u>: Our son, Perry, is a reporter for *The Arizona Republic* newspaper in Phoenix; he covers public safety and breaking news. His rescue dog, Luna, has been thrilled that Perry has been working from his apartment since March due to COVID. Through wonderful support from his teachers and doctors, and his own efforts, Perry has learned to manage learning disabilities and ADHD, and we are proud of him.

<u>Significant Mentor or Hero</u>: Ruth Bader Ginsburg, for fighting successfully for laws to provide equal rights for women in the workplace, as well as for being the most supreme of Supreme Court justices.

Current and Previous Employment: I was employed at Chevron from 1975–1995 as an information technology project manager, supervisor, and IT architect. As an intern in 1975, I was the first woman to work as an electrician in Chevron's Richmond refinery, and in 1977 the first woman to work in Chevron's "wildcat" drilling camps in the Arctic, installing prototype voice scramblers and encrypted facsimile machines over satellite communication systems. As an IT architect, I led the team designing the first major router-based corporate Intranet.

In 1995, I became a stay-at-home mom, volunteering with PTA at the local, county, and state levels advocating on behalf of children and families. In 2002, we initiated a special needs committee at the (school district) PTA Council. The committee held monthly programs for parents and school staff, as well as an annual day-long conference. We were able to foster trust with the school district, resulting in improved procedures for identifying and supporting children with special needs.

In 2005, the San Ramon Unified School District hired me to manage a two-year \$1.5 million project to design and implement a computerized special education system throughout the district. I enjoyed working with the dedicated teachers in completing the project on time and under budget. Following this project, I co-chaired two parcel tax campaigns for the SRVUSD, working with our PTA council. While PTA council president and VP for advocacy, our council won the first National PTA Outstanding Advocacy award for our work with our school district and statewide, as well as California State PTA outstanding unit awards in four areas. I then spent several years on the California State PTA Board of Managers, including working as an education advocate in Sacramento.

<u>Current Interests and Pastimes</u>: Since 2015, I have enjoyed traveling with either my husband or my 91-year-old mother, both of whom had been waiting patiently for me to retire from PTA volunteering. Clark and I have traveled to Alaska; the Antarctic, including South Georgia and the Falkland Islands; Turkey; the Galapagos. We cruised from Miami to SF through the Panama Canal. A highlight was sipping a brandy in the sauna after taking the Polar Plunge in the Southern Ocean south of the Antarctic Circle. We have also taken driving trips through the Pacific Northwest and national parks in Montana and Wyoming. Mom and I have visited New York, Canada, Norway, Europe, and southeast Asia.

In addition, I enjoy reading, movies, and working on the computer. I am trying to learn to enjoy exercise. I have spent way too much time following national politics over the past five years and am looking forward to the incoming competent leadership.

Memorable Experiences, Adventures, and/or Accomplishments: In 1992-1996, I was one of four plaintiffs in a sexual harassment/retaliation lawsuit and a named plaintiff representing 770 women in a class-action sex-discrimination lawsuit in the IT part of the company (both Vandell et al. vs. Chevron Corporation). At the time, Chevron was the 7th largest corporation in the world, and we were represented by a tiny but terrific law firm. Chevron admitted guilt and settled publicly in the harassment lawsuit, which shows how much the evidence was in our favor. The company settled under a consent decree in the discrimination lawsuit. In addition to monetary damages, we were able to negotiate injunctive relief with major policy changes benefitting women and minorities. The cases resulted in women being promoted and given salary increases throughout the corporation and complaints about harassment being taken seriously. Obviously, this didn't correct the culture completely, but we made a dent. As this case was unique for its time, it also resulted in other companies changing their policies. I never wanted to be involved in such a lawsuit, but top management's support for the harasser when shown evidence of life-threatening and sexualized abuse of a woman I had hired, as well as retaliation against me and 13 other women who complained about the same manager, made it clear that something needed to be done. The effort took a physical and emotional toll on me, and I left the company (and work that I loved) to recover and focus on our son, whose special needs were emerging.





