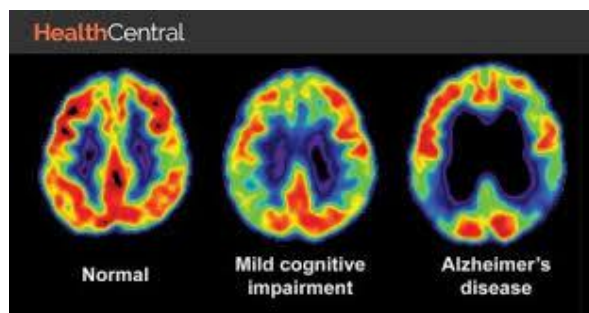

Co President's Pen



March is **Women's History Month**, when we celebrate historic achievements women have made in the past and continue to make today. Most struggled to overcome obstacles based on their sex alone but succeeded through determination, hard work, and triumph over failures. They were aided in their vision by hard-won legislation that promoted equity in the workplace, the private sector, public service areas, education, and politics. Activists through the years challenged myriad inequities and sacrificed much to advance women's rights, beginning with the first women's rights convention held in Seneca Falls, NY 1848!

These are just a few historic achievements by American women:

- Through the efforts of thousands of women, the 19th amendment was ratified in 1920 giving women the right to vote.
- First woman to win a Pulitzer Prize was Edith Wharton in 1920 for *The Age of Innocence*.
- In 1933, FDR chose Frances Perkins as his Secretary of Labor, the first female member of a president's cabinet.
- Sandra Day O'Connor, nominated by Ronald Reagan, was confirmed as the first woman to serve in the U.S. Supreme Court in 1981.
- In 1992, Mission Specialist Mae Jemison, aboard the Space Shuttle *Endeavor*, was the first woman of color to orbit the earth.
- Following many historic moments for women astronauts in the space program, Christina Koch and Jessica Meir performed the first all-female spacewalk in 2019.

- Kizzmekia Corbett, a viral immunologist, is currently the scientific lead of the VRC's (Vaccine Research Center) Coronavirus Team at the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, National Institutes of Health. Her team partnered with Moderna to help develop the vaccine to combat COVID-19.
- In January 2021, Kamala Harris became the first female, first Black, and first South-Asian vice president in U.S. history!

The future is positive and hopeful that women will continue to achieve their potential, effect change, and contribute to solving the challenges we face.

Our thanks to the Program VPs for arranging two excellent February programs: San Ramon City Updates presented by Sabina Zafar, branch member and SR City Council member, and Understanding COVID-19 Vaccines with UCR Professor Emeritus Brad Hyman.

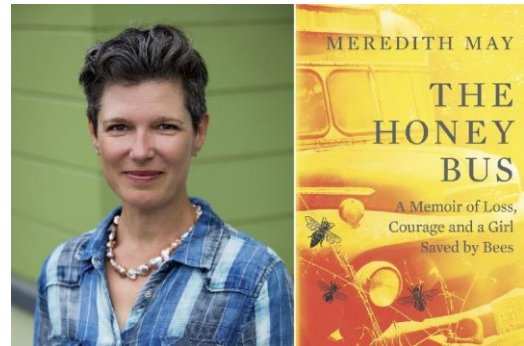

Tech Trek



Thank you to all who supported our Tips for Change fundraiser at Gianni's Italian Bistro held on February 15! It was another successful Tech Trek fundraiser for us, and Gianni's really appreciated the business we provided them. The event raised \$1,788 for Tech Trek that night—\$808 in tips collected in our tip jar and \$980 in credit card tips and percentage of sales. In addition to those amounts, more than \$200 in donation checks were mailed to us separately.

A big thanks to our volunteer curbside greeters and order deliverers: Leslie Adams, Cindy Alpert, Judy Bracken, Chris Burchik, and Lucy Weed. And apologies to those of you who had to wait a while at the curb for your order. The restaurant told us to expect some customers having to wait longer than others since they can't have all the orders ready at the same time (for example, there were 18 orders for one of the pickup time slots!), and they can't predict the order in which customers will arrive to pick up their orders. But I do hope everyone enjoyed their meal. Mine was delicious!

Our Tech Trek camper nomination process is complete and camper selection process has begun. In no surprise to me, we have far fewer nominations from teachers this year. I think teachers are quite busy with the virtual learning and likely don't know their students as well as they would with in-person instruction. We received a total of six nominations from just two of the four San Ramon middle schools by the February 12 nomination deadline; last year we had a total of 17 nominations from all four schools.

We may sponsor every San Ramon applicant for Tech Trek camp this year if our reader and interviewer subcommittees decide that each girl merits selection as one of our campers. With Tech Trek camper fees being only \$400 per camper this year (versus \$1,000 per camper last year), we requested 10 camper slots for the 2021 camp. If we sponsor fewer than 10 campers, we will have more of our Tech Trek funds available for future Tech Trek camper sponsorships.

The 2021 virtual Tech Trek camp is still seeking adult coaches for the robotics core course (held in the mornings) and the afternoon workshops. There will be three camp sessions (June 21–25, July 12–16, and July 26–30); coaches can volunteer for one or more sessions. New Member Recruitment

Spring is coming soon! March is a great time to bring new life to our branch with new members! That means for the first year of membership, they would receive a 50% discount on the national dues.

Also, for new members joining after March 15, there is a special deal! New members will receive a membership through June 2022. That means April, May, and June 2021 will be free!

Membership Renewal and Dues Increase

Renewal season will be here soon. AAUW membership follows the fiscal calendar and runs from July 1 to June 30 of the following year. Branch membership dues collection begins March 16. E-mailed online renewal notifications will be sent late spring. Beginning March 16, 2021, the AAUW national dues will have increased \$3.00, as explained in February's newsletter.

- AAUW national membership dues are \$62, of which \$59 is tax-deductible as a charitable contribution. The remaining \$3 is not tax deductible because it supports the AAUW Action Fund's section 501(c)(4) Capitol Hill Lobby Corps and get-out-the-vote activities.
- Our San Ramon Branch dues remain at \$20 and California state dues remain at \$20; neither is tax-deductible.
- AAUW national life membership is \$1,240 and is fully tax-deductible. Individuals considering life membership who qualify for national membership may pay 20 times the national rate one time (\$1,240) and become exempt from further national dues.

On January 29 and 30, members of our Scholarship Committee met with our two CSUEB Renaissance Scholars scholarship recipients (Michelle May and Dian Rodriguez) to present them with their second \$500 check and to update their personal and academic goals.

Julie Gin and I met with Dian Rodriguez outside at CSUEB; Chris Burchik, Lorraine Weir, and I met with Michelle May outside at Hacienda Crossings in Dublin. Both young women reported that they are doing well and very much appreciate the support from our organization. A brief summary of their current status follows.

Michelle May



Michelle is continuing in her senior year as a Human Development major. Following is a partially edited version of a letter that Michelle has written to our branch.

Hello fellow AAUW members,

I must start out by saying 2020 was one of the toughest years to date. In so many ways I am very thankful that I am still here and able! I am sure many can relate to what I am about to say, so soon as I had my ducks in a row and chickens clucking, the storm set in aka Covid-19. I did not know how things would get as tough as it had gotten, not just for me, but for my daughter as well. Schooling during the pandemic for me began to be impossible. I couldn't fathom making my daughter's academic needs become subordinate to my own. As a result, I decided that I would give my studies up in exchange to closely support my daughter in 1st grade while distance learning. In the past, if things felt too much for me, I'd make slight adjustments, but the pandemic caused me to make drastic adjustments. No matter what dropping my studies meant for my presumed graduation date, the pandemic caused barely manageable times for me as a single parent. I went from working well over 52 hours a week to averaging 24 hours per week between two jobs.

Now that I feel like I can manage my life through this pandemic a little better, for this spring I signed back up for three courses: Intro to Human Development, Adolescent Development & Emerging Adult, and lastly, Theories of Human Development. All together, I am enrolled in nine units and my new anticipated graduation date will be fall of 2022.

My plan after graduation is to work as a social worker in the hospital with elders who have to be released to long term care facilities or temporary care facilities, if possible, I would also like to play a role in the placement of children who have to be sent to foster care. My first priority is elder care. My goal outside of working for an establishment is to open up my own assisted living home, where I can plan trips, and spend time with aging adults, supporting them in living life as they would want to.

I am looking forward to completing this term by any means necessary and also our teachers getting all of what they want and deserve out of a system that has never valued their worth in my opinion. I strongly feel that this pandemic has shed much light on many systems and the flaws they've entailed, so I hope this action will provide more equality and transparency for all, not the minority (the wealthy), but the majority (us). I am always hopeful and optimistic!

The work you and the AAUW members are doing is very much needed and I also appreciate this. Being a recipient of a grant/scholarship let's me know that my work is noticed, and somebody has my back. I can't wait to be in a position to give back on a level like this. It's a warm feeling to have.

Dian is completing her senior year as a Human Development major and is on track to graduate in May 2021! She has completed all of her requirements for her major and is currently taking three classes to complete her minor in Sociology.

She reports that last semester went well; it was a bit stressful, but she was able to finish strong. Dian continues to live in Belmont and work for the San Mateo County Housing Authority. Her goal after graduation was to get a higher position at her job at SMC, but she was able to do this over winter break. She has been in her new position

since January and is no longer considered extra help, but a full-time Office Assistant. Dian feels challenged with this new position and with a different supervisor, but very positive and proud of herself.

Dian shared that she is very excited to finish college and to be the first generation of her family to graduate. After graduation, she plans to take a year off from school and decide if she wants to continue her education. Dian also expressed that personally, she is "very happy with where I am now." Our branch has been able to support Dian since her sophomore year at CSUEB and we are very proud of her many accomplishments and the academic and personal skills that she has developed.

Kimberly Susan Budil



Women are making strides in all areas, including STEM fields! In January 2021, Kimberly Budil, with more than 30 years of experience in management and leadership, became the first woman to become the director of Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory. She has been an early advocate for women in science. She participated in the Lawrence Livermore Laboratory Women's Association and organized numerous technical women's conferences, and she later contributed to international panels such as the American Physical Society's Committee on the Status of Women in Physics.

According to *Pleasanton Weekly*, “in addition to setting the Lab’s ‘strategic vision,’ Budil will oversee its development and implementation. She will also provide President Joe Biden with ‘an annual technical assessment of the state of the nuclear weapons stockpile including its safety, security and effectiveness.’”

Per Wikipedia, Kimberly Susan Budil is an American physicist and the director of [Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory](#). She earned her bachelor's degree in physics in 1987 from the [University of Illinois at Chicago](#) and her Ph.D. from the [University of California, Davis](#) in 1994. [University of California \(Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory, Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory and Los Alamos National Laboratory\)](#). In 2019, she was Principal Associate Director for Weapons & Complex Integration at LLNL. Also in 2019, she was made a fellow of the [American Physical Society](#). In 2021, she was named the Director of [Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory](#), becoming the first woman to hold the position.

From the AAUW Board of Directors

The AAUW National Board of Directors strongly supports elimination of the degree requirement for membership and will put the requirement up for a membership vote this spring. This important change is a critical step in bringing AAUW’s bylaws and membership requirement in line with our mission of advancing equity for women and girls. While AAUW is fiercely committed to the educational attainment of all women, given our commitment to inclusion, this is simply the right thing to do.

Proposals to eliminate the degree requirement for membership have come before the membership for vote a number of times. The Board feels very strongly that, while the degree requirement made perfect sense at AAUW’s inception, this requirement is now counter to our mission and limits our ability to build the capacity needed to increase our impact as an organization.

Voting will open on April 7, 2021 and close May 17, 2021 5:00 PM ET.
