The AAUW National Board of Directors strongly supports elimination of the degree requirement for membership and will put the requirement up for a membership vote this spring. This important change is a critical step in bringing AAUW's bylaws and membership requirement in line with our mission of advancing equity for women and girls. While AAUW is fiercely committed to the educational attainment of all women, given our commitment to inclusion, this is simply the right thing to do.

Proposals to eliminate the degree requirement for membership have come before the membership for vote a number of times. The Board feels very strongly that, while the degree requirement made perfect sense at AAUW's inception, this requirement is now counter to our mission and limits our ability to build the capacity needed to increase our impact as an organization.

Voting will open on April 7, 2021 and close May 17, 2021 5:00 PM ET.

You'll see that you do not need to log in, just click on your link and renew! It is that simple. We strongly encourage you to renew by credit card using this e-mailed link. It is quick and easy for you, and it saves time, resources, and money for the branch.

If you prefer to pay by check, please print the e-mail that you receive. Note any changes to your contact information on the form and return the form with dues check payable to AAUW San Ramon to our Finance Vice President, Claire Mailhiot, 70 Mesquite Lane, San Ramon, CA 94583.

As a reminder, AAUW Membership dues are **\$102.** National dues are \$62, of which \$59 is tax deductible as a charitable contribution, and \$3 is not (because it supports the AAUW Action Fund's Section 501(c)(4) Lobby Corps and get-out-the-vote activities). California dues are \$20 and branch dues are \$20. Life members pay only state and branch dues and dual in-state members pay only branch dues.

Please consider including a donation to the AAUW Fund with your dues. If you renew by e-mailed link, you will be given the option to include a donation at that time. If you pay your dues by check, the donation can be included. For example, if your dues are \$102 and you wish to donate \$10, write a check for \$112.

Many thanks in advance to all members who renew before the end of June. It really makes a difference in helping the branch to run smoothly and frees up more of our time and energy to focus on accomplishing branch goals and fulfilling AAUW's mission.

News From National

On February 2, 2021, AAUW CA Public Policy Co-Chairs Sue Miller and Kathy Harper met via Zoom with AAUW Public Policy Director Kate Nielsen and her assistant Robin Lucas, along with state public policy chairs across the nation, to get updates on changes to the public policy landscape with the new administration and Congress. Here is a summary of what we thought members would like to know:

- 1. AAUW Public Policy team sent notice of our priorities for the new year
 - Letter to the President, focused on
 - o Women's Economic Security
 - \circ Education Access
 - Letter to 117th Congress
 - Passing the Paycheck Fairness Act
 - Passing the Equity in Education Act
- 2. Outline of AAUW's priorities for the Administration and Congress
 - Biden-Harris in the first two weeks: 41 Executive Covid measures, including student-debt relief and opening of schools
 - Anti-discrimination, including removing barriers, DACA relief, and a Task Force to reunite families
 - Protecting women's health at home and abroad, including access to abortions
 - Coming Legislation from Congress
 - Covid relief: \$1.9 Trillion package
 Paid sick & family leave extended through September (14 weeks)
 - -Increase minimum wage to \$15
 - -Assistance to those at risk of losing jobs &/or their homes
 - -\$3B to help women with food relief for their families
 - -\$25B emergency fund for child care providers
 - Raise the Wage Act (\$15 by 2025)
 - o FAMILY Act (emphasis on access to paid leave)
 - Paycheck Fairness Act: HR7
 - -AAUW working on since 1997
 - -Reintroduced 2/1
 - -Strong bi-partisan support
 - -Prohibits retaliation for discussing pay
 - -Closes loopholes in Equal Pay Act
 - -Bans using prior salary history in hiring decisions

Tech Trek Update

After reviewing the applications received and interviewing (via Zoom) the girls, our readers and interview subcommittees agreed that the San Ramon branch should sponsor all five girls for Tech Trek camp. The next step is for the girls' parents to register their daughters for the camp.

Our Tech Trek campers will attend one of the three oneweek virtual Tech Trek camps: June 21–25, July 12–16 or July 26–30. Each girl was asked to indicate in their application which week they prefer.

Dr. Shirley Jackson "The Ultimate Role Model for Women in Science"



On May 19, 2016, President Barack Obama awarded Dr. Jackson the National Medal of Science in recognition for her research achievements, achievements in science-rooted public policy, and for inspiring the next generation of STEM talent, the three fields in which she strived to make a difference.

In addition to receiving 55 honorary doctoral degrees, numerous awards, and leadership roles across academia, government, and scientific industries, Dr. Jackson holds a B.S. in Physics, and a Ph.D. in Theoretical Elementary Particle Physics from MIT (Massachusetts Institute of Technology). She is the first African American woman to receive a doctorate of any kind from that university!

Early in her career at Bell Labs, Dr. Jackson helped in the discoveries that led to the fax machine, touch tone phones, solar cells, fiber optic cables, caller ID, and call waiting. She taught physics for four years at Rutgers University in Maryland before moving to the role of Chairman of the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission from 1995 to 1999. She then took on her current role as President of RPI at age 53, and has participated on various advisory boards including as Co-Chair of President Obama's Intelligence Advisory Board, the Advisory Council of the Institute of Nuclear Power Operations, and leadership in the formation of the International Nuclear Regulators Association.

In spite of the challenges she faced as a woman and a woman of color in a male dominated arena, Dr. Jackson's career advanced to the highest echelons in the fields of science and education. She credits her parents for encouraging her interest and success in science. They emphasized the "value of hard work, being of service to others, and striving for excellence". She attended public schools in Washington D.C. and excelled in her subjects with the encouragement of her teachers.

When she got to MIT as an undergrad in 1964, she encountered some obstacles as one of only two African American women in her class. Her plan was to major in physics but when she sought advice from her professor, the reply was, "Colored girls should learn a trade" in spite of the fact that she had the highest grades in the class and was proud of her African American heritage. Although discouraged, she saw that she had a choice. She thought, "I could give in to ignorance or persevere and pursue excellence. I chose the latter and made physics my 'trade."

Dr. Jackson received her B.S. in Physics and pursued her graduate studies at MIT in theoretical elementary particle physics. Inspired by civil rights leaders of the time like MLK, she co-founded the Black Students' Union and joined an educational opportunity task force. Through these efforts and recommendations, MIT began to actively recruit minority students for the first time, proving that, "talent and success in science and engineering is not limited to one race, gender, or story of origin."

Dr. Jackson was inspired and encouraged in her career and academic pursuits by several women who managed to balance groundbreaking careers while raising families and dealing with the issues of their work being undervalued by institutions and male counterparts. An exception to this was one of her mentors, MIT President Paul Gray who recognized and encouraged her leadership skills. Among her mentors and eventually her friends were Professor Millie Dresselhaus, Ph.D., the first tenured woman professor at MIT, often called "the queen of carbon science", and theoretical elementary particle physicist Mary K. Gaillard, Ph.D, admired by Dr. Jackson for her ability to focus on her advanced research while organizing worldwide conferences, and raising 3 children. Dr. Jackson is married to Morris A. Washington, a physics professor at RPI, and has one son.

When asked about what skills women should focus on and develop to become successful in their careers, Dr. Jackson replied, "Skills vary with the field, but certain qualities are universal among high-achieving women: tenacity, a focus on excellence, a stubborn unwillingness to be dissuaded from the work they most enjoy, and the empathy for others—that is at the heart of leadership." She added that she was not so much driven by ambition as the sense of service learned from (her) parents.

Dr. Jackson's career advice was particularly encouraging for recent women graduates in STEM fields. "...they should be prepared to encounter unconscious bias from people in authority" so it does not discourage them and "allow no one to rob their confidence." She continued, "...become so undeniably excellent that even the most chauvinistic of bosses or advisors cannot withstand their brilliance...and never ...give up, because the world needs their talents and their ideas."

AAUW Fellow Tracy Quezada

Tracy Quezada is a "Community Action Grant" AAUW Fellow recipient. She is a documentary filmmaker and journalist, and she is currently working on her Masters in Journalism within the discipline of Communications at UC Berkeley.

Tracy has produced and edited documentaries that address the school-to-prison pipeline, immigration, and race in America.

Her current documentary examines one of the most taboo issues of our time—child sexual abuse—an issue that the U.S. Centers for Disease Control has called a "public health crisis." Her research investigates the fundamental systemic and structural issues that contribute to society's failure to grapple with intergenerational sexual abuse.

To address this issue, Tracy has created a multimedia impact campaign and documentary film entitled *When You Were Young*. She and her team hope to distribute this program along with related curriculum to 500 universities within 3 years.

Making Powerful Allies: Virtual Lobby Day

I nervously waited for Assembly Member <u>Tim Grayson</u> (District 14) to join our virtual call. Never having lobbied before, I wasn't sure whether to be excited or intimidated. The <u>AAUW CA Public Policy</u> team had prepped 120+ volunteers well. Scripts, talking points, pep talks from star-power women—Senate Majority Leader Eloise Gomez Reyes; AM Cristina Garcia, head of the <u>California</u> <u>Legislature Women's Caucus</u>; and our new Advocate <u>Kathy Van Osten</u>. They said AAUW was well-respected in Sacramento. Let your pride shine through! But how would our messages be received?

Our March 24 call started out chattier than expected (AM Grayson is a politician after all). He was familiar with AAUW. It's extremely useful to have thoughtful constituents summarize bills and explain their importance, Grayson disclosed. AAUW CA will prioritize 30 bills for 2021 and we laid out arguments for the Top 3: AB92 Childcare Family Fees (which AAUW co-sponsors), SB62 Garment Worker Protection Act, and SB373 Consumer Debt: Economic Abuse. Chris Ritter (Danville-Alamo-Walnut Creek), Denise Burien (Orinda-Moraga-Lafayette), and I gave convincing pitches in our 20-minute call. Grayson gave a thumbs up on all three, with the caveat that he will read the full text and noted that strange additions can hitchhike on the final versions. He requested AAUW keep his office informed as these bills pass milestones.

Virtual Lobby Day was a resounding success according to all the teams' feedback. It will be fun to see AAUW priorities move from hopes and dreams to the law of the land. Next year—hopefully back to Sacramento in person!
