AAUW SR COVID Update for the Summer of 2021

Our community is moving forward to a brighter "new normal" after 14+ months of living under COVID uncertainty. Socializing with fellow members remains a valuable AAUW benefit. Everyone is curious! When will we see each other in person again? Expect a phased return to in-person.

This article outlines our SR board policy in place *through* September 2021 for AAUW sanctioned in-person gettogethers. Since health and government guidance continues to evolve, we will update this policy in the September newsletter.

Policy through September 2021: AAUW-sanctioned gettogethers should remain on Zoom. This includes the board planning session, the September 11 Kick-off, board meetings, and interest groups.

Our branch consists of people with a wide range of needs and risk profiles. Informal surveys and discussions with members have revealed there are too many members who still feel uncomfortable in large group settings. The Board of Directors presidents (outgoing and incoming) believe it is important for activities to be inclusive and to avoid putting AAUW members in the uncomfortable position of having to be "vaccine police."

Having said that, all of you are free citizens and each can make personal decisions about smaller private gettogethers with your AAUW friends.

After September: The board will continue to monitor the situation. Assuming the situation continues to look more positive, the board will revise its position to allow in-person get-togethers. This date is not a commitment, and some restrictions may apply. Check the September newsletter for an update.

A note about the November 2021 Auction event: The Scholarship Committee earlier made the decision to cancel this event. The decision was made not so much to avoid an in-person event, but rather to respect how our business donors have been challenged by the pandemic. We hope you will continue to support both our auction vendors and the worthy scholarship program in other ways during the 2021–2022 year.

Will Zoom go away? Zoom will not disappear from AAUW. Just like getting groceries delivered, sometimes visiting your doctor online, and online cocktails with faraway friends, Zoom is here to stay—although not for everything! AAUW SR members like many things about online meetings including broader participation, ease of getting quality speakers, ability to make content richer with videos and photos, and not having to drive at night or during inclement weather. Organizations in all arenas of life are committing to a "hybrid" approach. Expect some activities to remain on Zoom while others will be in person.

Thank you for your patience! We know you are looking forward to seeing your AAUW friends in person when conditions meet your personal safety requirements. Your membership in AAUW SR is very important. Please continue to support our community and our mission as we move through this next strange chapter of our joint experience!

Renewal Reminder

Your membership team is very pleased to report that as of mid-May, over 30% of our members have renewed and/or are current through 2022 on dues payments! We thank all members who have renewed their memberships! AAUW branch memberships will expire on June 30, and our branch begins a new membership and fiscal year on July 1. A renewal notice was sent on May 1 to all current members by e-mail, so please check your computer's inbox. A reminder renewal notice will be sent by early June to all members who still need to renew.

The simplest, fastest, and most efficient way to renew is by using a credit card to renew by e-mail. Look for an email message sent to you from memberinfo@aauw.org with the subject "AAUW Membership Renewal for Fiscal Year 2022" that will contain <u>your unique</u> <u>renewal link</u>. You'll see that you do not need to log in, just click and renew! It is that simple.

If you did not receive this e-mail message, please check your spam/junk folder and, if it is not there, just contact the Membership VPs so we can have it sent to you again.

We strongly encourage you to renew using this e-mail link. It is quick and easy for you, and it saves time, resources, and money for the branch.

If you prefer to pay by check, please print the e-mail that you receive. Note any changes to your contact information on the form. Mail the form with your dues check payable to AAUW San Ramon to our VP of Finance: Claire Mailhiot.

As a reminder, AAUW Membership dues are now **\$102.** National dues are \$62, of which \$59 is tax deductible as a charitable contribution, and \$3 is not (because it supports the AAUW Action Fund's Section 501(c)(4) Lobby Corps and get-out-the-vote activities). California dues are \$20 and branch dues are \$20. Life members pay only state and branch dues and dual in-state members pay only branch dues. Please consider including a donation to the **AAUW Fund** with your dues. If you renew via e-mailed link, you will be given the option to include a donation at that time. If you pay your dues by check, the donation can be paid with the same check. For example, if your dues are \$102 and you wish to donate \$10, write a check for \$112.

Public Policy



Legislation to Watch

In 2021, AAUW California will focus on childcare, which meets the goals of all of our three pillars.

Without affordable childcare for families, women are often the ones to leave their jobs or forgo education to care for their children. This has been the case for tens of thousands of women during the COVID pandemic, jeopardizing their financial security and ability to get higher paying jobs.

We are supporting a package of legislation that will improve access to quality early childhood education for low-income children and especially children of color, make family fees affordable, and improve the quality of childcare for children aged up to age 3.

- AB 92—Waives family fees thru 10/22, then restructures rates for family fees (we are cosponsors of this bill)
- AB 22—Transitional Kindergarten for 4-year olds
- SB 70—Mandatory Kindergarten
- SB 246—Restructuring childcare rate reimbursement to improve the quality of childcare
- AB 1361—Expulsion of children from childcare

These bills help women achieve economic security, improve the quality of childcare and early learning in preparation for education, and help eliminate bias in how children of color are treated in childcare.

If you want to track the progress of these bills through the California legislature, you can go to the AAUW CA website under Public Policy and click on "Bill Tracking." It is critical to the health and well-being of women and children that these bills pass. <u>https://www.aauw-ca.org/documents/2021/04/bill-tracking.pdf/</u>

I encourage you follow these bills and send letters to your state senator and representative asking for their yes vote.

After the camps are done, I'll prepare a turnover for the San Ramon Branch's incoming 2021–2022 Tech Trek Coordinators Stella Hadjimarkos and Cordelia Hwang. I'm sure Stella and Cordelia will do a great job together!

Our branch's Tech Trek program is in good shape. Many of our members know about and support AAUW Tech Trek, and our San Ramon Branch Tech Trek account balance (held by AAUW California) is \$10,898. Having that account balance provides a nice financial cushion since 2022 camp fees are unknown, fundraising success is hoped for but not a given, and the branch will likely want to sponsor six girls for camp (as done in past years). Let's hope the 2022 Tech Trek Camps will be back on college campuses so our campers can have a full Tech Trek Camp experience—with all the camaraderie, hands-on learning, and fun and exciting STEM (science, technology, engineering, math) activities that Tech Trek Camp can provide.

As this is my last San Ramon Tech Trek program update, I want to thank all of you that have contributed to the Tech Trek program during the three years I've been San Ramon Branch Tech Trek Coordinator. I greatly appreciate your contributions whether they were your time, talents, and/or financial donations. So, thank you everyone!

High School Scholarship Recipients

The 2021 scholarship recipients have been selected! We have awarded \$1,000 scholarships to five outstanding young women from California High School. The quality of applicants continues to be very strong, with this year's recipients presenting a wide range of skills and interests. They have demonstrated significant academic skills as well as accomplishments in music, art, science, athletics, world languages, and leadership. Several have also been very involved in community volunteer or social activities, participated in internships, or held part-time jobs.

Our process for selecting these recipients followed a similar pattern to 2020 in that we were not able to meet our applicants in person.

Interviews: Since we were not able to have personal meetings, we did a paper screening and then selected five recipients for our \$1,000 scholarships.

Zoom Meetings: Julie Gin, Loranne Weir, Sally Scholl, Sally Blackwell, and I met with each recipient to congratulate them personally and to gain more personal information as we do during the individual interviews.

Home Visits: Julie, Loranne, and I visited each of the recipient's homes (maintaining social distance and wearing masks) to meet with them and present them with some congratulatory goodies along with informational paperwork required for our organization and their university. They were also invited to our Zoom End-of-the-Year Celebration event. I hope that those of you who attended this event were able to meet them briefly.

Following is a brief overview of their many accomplishments and future goals.

Sophie will attend University of San Francisco in the fall. She has been accepted into the School of Nursing and Health Professions and received a Merit scholarship from USF. Her goal is to receive her BSN degree and possibly continue for a Master's degree while working in Pediatrics. Sophie has been involved in several on-campus activities including California Scholarship Federation, National Honor Society, and Key Club. She has served as a representative to the San Ramon Teen Council and is currently the president of Key Club.

Some of Nikhita's on-campus activities have included playing trumpet in the marching band and wind ensemble and serving as a photographer and social media editor for the student newspaper. Additionally, she has developed more skills in social media management and gained employment experience in this area with her 4H club, a goat breeding company, and on-line products with Etsy. Nikhita also enjoys photography, calligraphy, and embroidery.

Christine will attend UC Berkeley in the fall. She plans to major in Sociology and Journalism and is interested in working with investigative and social justice reporting. Christine is currently the editor-in-chief for the Cal High newspaper and has been honored as a student "Journalist of the Year" by the Contra Costa County News group. Her other on-campus activities have included Kev Club, CSF. and NHS. She has held several leadership positions in these groups, including serving as president.
