The Contra Costa County Interbranch Council (CCC IBC) met on November 16. This committee comprises representatives from each AAUW branch in Contra Costa County and meets five times a year. Its purpose is to share information from AAUW CA as well as provide updates from each branch on challenges, opportunities, and events. The committee also plans an annual Ice Cream Social for girls selected to go to Tech Trek camp. Other programs of general interest have been planned in the past as well.

At the November meeting, we heard a very interesting presentation from two directors on the AAUW CA Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) Committee. This is a new committee formed at the state level. While DEI has always been part of the AAUW mission, the formation of the committee is intended to provide resources to the branches around this topic. The DEI committee mission statement is:

AAUW seeks to promote inclusion and awareness for all members to create an equitable, sustainable, and inclusive membership reflective of today's world.

AAUW also has a DEI committee and has developed toolkits and resources for branches for use in programming and discussing this very important topic.

Tech Trek



As the year comes to an end, the California Tech Trek Leadership reflects on all that we accomplished this year, as well as planning for next year and setting the vision for the future.

Accomplishments for AAUW CA Tech Trek in 2021

Let the numbers tell the story of our accomplishments. During the 2021 Virtual Camps we featured

- 624 campers over 3 weeks of camps,
- 229 volunteers,
- >10,000 hours of prep time,
- Single Core Class—Qualcomm's Thinkabit Wearable Tech attended by all students, and
- 12 90-minute workshops offered; 4 mandatory, 8 optional.

Plans for CA Tech Trek in 2022

We were very fortunate to get a new Tech Trek Program Director, Karen Manelis, who led a webinar on October 26, and a new Financial Liaison, Susan Stecklair.

The 2022 Tech Trek Camp current plans are for IN-PERSON camps for a total of nine (9) weeks of camp on seven (7) partner campuses: Stanford, Sonoma, UC Davis, Whittier, San Diego, Fresno, and Santa Barbara. The San Ramon branch chose Sonoma as our first-choice campus with UC Davis as an alternate. The CDC, FDA, State and School mandates will be followed. This info will be included on the application. There is a backup plan to switch to virtual camps if need be.

The cost is still unknown but is expected to rise up to 50%, to \$1,500 per camper. Our branch aims to send six (6) students to camp. The information packets with forms for the volunteers and teachers are expected to be sent around December 1. The dates for the camps will not be known until January.

Our leaders are researching new "off the shelf" camp management software to replace all paper forms and streamline the process from nomination to camp followups. At least four programs are being evaluated. Training will be provided. The cost of the software and the training hopefully will be covered by undesignated grant funding so the branches will not have to be charged.

AAUW CA Tech Trek Committee

A Tech Trek Committee was appointed in July and held a meeting on October 25. Its immediate goals are to use input and expertise from AAUW CA and Tech Trek communities to advance and strengthen the Tech Trek Program. It established work groups to tackle the following issues: Technology, Social Media, Tech Trek Alumnae Groups (TTAG), Data Evaluation/Coordination, Grants, and Training.

Its tasks for 2022 are as follows:

- Create Branch Coordinator peer group and provide training for all volunteer roles.
- ➤ Establish relationships with professional STEM organizations (like Society of Women Engineers, etc.) that we can tap into for faculty and staff to develop curriculum.
- ➤ Move Evaluation and Marketing needs from a tri-fold to online methods.
- Come up with better tracking of past campers.
- ➤ Improve finance by reviewing job descriptions, revamping stipends, and clarifying family fees.
- ➤ Increase camper diversity, review camper-to-staff ratio and essay questions.

Public Policy



This month we share excerpts from an article presented in *The Hechinger Report*, which covers "Innovation and Inequality in Education." The article goes into some depth about how the Infrastructure Bill could benefit women, especially women of color, who have been marginalized when seeking careers in the construction trades.

Women have been marginalized in the building trades. The infrastructure bill could change that.

Advocates say the bill presents an opportunity to bring down barriers that have long kept women and people of color from construction jobs.

Fewer than 11 percent of payroll employees in construction are female, and when it comes to the industry's non-office jobs that require working with tools, the share is even smaller, 4 percent. Meanwhile, nearly 89 percent of construction employees are white (including some Hispanic people). . . .

The infrastructure and domestic spending bills represent an historic opportunity to change those numbers, advocates say. The \$1 trillion infrastructure bill would create hundreds.org/jobs, if not millions, repairing roads, ports and bridges, electrifying the power grid, replacing aged pipes and expanding high-speed Internet. The framework for [the] \$1.75 trillion investments that tradeswomen and workforce experts say could help recruit, train and retain women and people of color, who've been marginalized by sexism and racism within the construction industry.

Hostility to women, along with opaque pathways into the trades that favor friends, brothers, in-laws and other relatives, . . . have combined to drive down the number of women and people of color. Even amid a severe shortage of skilled trades workers that has left employers scrambling to fill openings, the barriers to entry for women remain high. . . .

As the building trades face a "silver tsunami" of retirements, many infrastructure jobs (most of which are in construction) are already going vacant. According to a September <u>study</u> by the National League of Cities, more than 30 percent of infrastructure jobs are hard to fill, meaning it takes longer than expected to fill them, and 32 percent of manager positions in infrastructure are open for more than 45 days.

In part because of the high numbers of infrastructure workers retiring—an <u>estimated 2.7 million</u> over the past decade—some employers appear to be more open to recruiting women now than they were in the past. Women's share of construction trades jobs increased from about 3 percent to 4 percent over the past five or so years, according to Ariane Hegewisch, a senior research fellow at the nonprofit Institute for Women's Policy Research. Meanwhile, construction was <u>one of just two industries</u> in which the number of women workers increased since February 2020, she said. . . .

While President Biden's infrastructure <u>proposal</u> called for \$100 billion in workforce training, that money was left out of the Senate version of the bill. So, too, was an <u>amendment</u> sponsored by Senator Kirsten Gillibrand (D-NY) that would have set a goal that 15 percent of labor hours on projects be completed by apprentices, along with support for training and child care and requirements for respectful workplaces.

Now advocates are pinning their hopes on the domestic spending bill before Congress. A draft containing tens of billions for workforce development including trades preapprenticeship and apprenticeship programs, left them encouraged. So, too, does the bill's commitment to making child care more affordable: The lack of child care often makes a career in the trades, with its demanding, irregular hours, a non-starter for women.


