"Now and Then" A Presentation by Kathy Moore



A little background: Kathy Moore (Kathy McCarroll Moore) is a collector of stories, discarded objects, and memories. She is a mentor teacher, book coach, and staff developer who served three terms as Poet Laureate for the City of San Ramon. Kathy holds a Doctorate in Educational Leadership for Social Justice, and she uses her passion for poetry to promote kindness, empathy, and connection. Kathy retired from the San Ramon Unified School District as Director of Instruction in 2019.

She currently serves as a family literacy book coach for Kristi Yamaguchi's Always Dream, a non-profit organization that connects low-income families with access to high-quality books.

She is the author of the chapbook *Avians of Mourning* and the forthcoming collection *Alphapoetica: A Poetry Primer for the Everyday Poet*. Her novels for children include *Elinormal* and *New Girl: The Further Adventures of Elinormal*.



She and her husband, Bob, have been active members of the community for more than 30 years, serving on numerous boards and raising four beautiful daughters. She is grateful for her East Coast roots and loves living in Northern California where the sky is always blue, the birds are always singing, the garden is always beckoning, and her children and grandchildren are always close by.



Tech Trek



Annually, the San Ramon Branch of AAUW sends young women from the four San Ramon middle schools to Tech Trek—a weeklong Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math ("STEM") summer camp. This year we want to send six seventh-grade girls to Tech Trek camp, to be held inperson at Sonoma State University in Rohnert Park, California.

The dates of the camp are expected to be announced in early January. The option of attending a virtual/hybrid camp is also going to be available.

We have a Tech Trek team at our branch that has been preparing for this. The team consists of some returning members and some new ones. We welcome Arila Barnes, Vicki Turbeville, Nancy Vandell, and Rebecca Said to our happy bunch!

The exact cost per camper has not been determined yet. The AAUW California Tech Trek will recommend sponsorships of either \$1,000 or \$1,100 per camper to the AAUW California Board in January, as they are the group that sets this cost. This amount represents a 10% increase over our last in-person camp year (2019)—much better than the original 50% estimate.

We need monetary support to accomplish our goal of sending six girls to the camp. We thank the members who made generous contributions already. We are still accepting donations!

Our biggest fundraiser is coming up. You and your family and friends can enjoy an evening of delectable Italian food at Gianni's Italian Bistro, the finest restaurant in San Ramon, on Monday, February 28. Women's Reproductive Rights— Where Are We Now?

By January 22, 2022, the 49th anniversary of the *Roe vs Wade* decision, SCOTUS (the Supreme Court of the United States) will have heard arguments on Texas SB 8 legislation banning pregnancy termination after six (6) weeks and Mississippi's legislation (*Dobbs vs Jackson Women's Health Organization*) to ban abortion after fifteen (15) weeks.

What are the issues? For Texas, it isn't about the constitutionality of the legislation, i.e. the fundamental right decided *by Roe vs Wade*. Instead, a decision will be made on the tactics used by the Texas legislature—delegating their enforcement duties to citizens—to preclude lawsuits against the State.

The decision on the Mississippi legislation will be straightforward. One, SCOTUS could overturn *Roe vs Wade*. Two, the court could limit legal standing to challenges on state law, e.g., doctors wouldn't be able to challenge on behalf of patients. Three, new legal standards for the evaluation of abortion regulations may be created so states aren't required to show that the benefits of an abortion ban outweigh the undue burden to patients—reversing *Planned Parenthood vs Casey*. (*Women's Health Policy*, 11/21/2021)

One hundred six (106) state laws have been passed to restrict abortion in 2021. Activists, like AAUW, are bringing lawsuits before the Supreme Court. AAUW has submitted an amicus brief for *Whole Women's Health vs Dobbs* as to the constitutionality of the Mississippi law.

In addition, the ACLU and others have brought lawsuits against other Mississippi abortion-related legislation like regulations for informed consent, a waiting period before the procedure, and a ban on telemedicine visits.

Surveys show that 60–70% of Americans approve of abortion in all or most circumstances. Only 20% think abortion should be illegal in all circumstances. (*New York Times*, "Upshot," 5/19/2021). AAUW and AAUW California stand with the majority, and the time to act is now. We must pressure the Senate to pass the **Women's Health Protection Act**. The legislation must become law in this session. Unfair changes in representation have occurred with redistricting. Votes in the 2022 mid-term elections that would elect representatives who would vote for this bill could be suppressed.
