# **Telling Stories**

As an avid consumer of media, I was excited to learn that the theme of Women's History Month (March 2023) is "Celebrating Women Who Tell Our Stories," highlighting women who are active in all kinds of media and storytelling including print, radio, TV, stage, screen, blogs, podcasts, news, and social media. In the U.S., women make up 50.5% of the total population. Without women's stories, half of what's happening is hidden.

## **Tell Your Story**

We all have stories. Although we may not be Maya Angelou, Barbara Walters, or Sofia Coppola, our voices have value. Telling our stories creates a legacy for future generations, helps us know ourselves better, and puts our lives into perspective. Have you ever thought about writing your life's story? Here are some tips from *Family Tree Magazine:* 

- **Autobiography vs. memoir**: Which do you want to write? An autobiography covers your whole life, a memoir is a few stories and themes.
- Decide what to leave in (and out): Most of our lives are boring, but you don't want to leave out your daily life. My great aunt left us the story of her grandmother (my great-great grandmother), and it was a delight to read about the mundane details of her home. (Consider writing about your mother's or grandmother's life.)
- Handle sensitive issues in context: Many women's stories have difficult or potentially embarrassing aspects but staying silent may not be helpful. Start with some non-personal history to frame one person's story as part of something larger.

In her current role, she also serves on the Behavioral Health Committee and Emergency Medical Services Committee.

**Gayle Israel** has been Chief of Staff to Contra Costa County Supervisor Candace Andersen since 2013. We raised \$2,300. This amount, combined with prior Tech Trek donations, exceeded our branch's goal of raising \$7,500. This will fund three spots at the 2023 AAUW Tech Trek STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) virtual camp, plus five residential camper spots at Sonoma State University in June.

A big thanks to our branch servers who earned great tips: Judy Bracken, Chris Burchik, Andreé Chagnon, Karen Rice, Kathleen Schaub, Kathy Senti, Lucy Weed, and Janet Williams. A special thanks to Steve Burchik, our chocolatier extraordinaire, who donated the magnificent basket of chocolates, and to Betsy Hoffmann, who did a fantastic job selling raffle tickets. We made almost \$500 from the raffle alone! Congratulations to grand prize winner, Claire Mailhiot, and second place winner, Judy Bracken.

The branch especially thanks Gianni and Melanie Bartoletti, owners of Gianni's Italian Bistro, who graciously offered their superb restaurant for this fundraiser and donated 10 percent of the evening's proceeds, along with all the tips, to Tech Trek.

Our total this year is inching closer to the income we achieved in pre-Covid years. For comparison, we made \$2,700 in 2019 and \$3,100 in 2020. The last two years, with take-out only, made around \$1,800 each year. Glad we could get back to inside dining!

We hope to do even better next year. We have reserved the date for February 5, 2024.

## **Tech Trek Committee News**

This year, all four San Ramon middle schools have submitted nominations, for a total of 15 nominees. Parents have been contacted, and the student application deadline is February 28. Completed applications and essays will be evaluated by our Reader Subcommittee in early March. It will be an exciting time as we evaluate imaginative essays about future STEM achievements. Finalists will be chosen for the final phase of camper selection, and Zoom interviews will be scheduled for late March. The fees for the virtual and residential campers will be transferred to the camps by March 15, and camper sponsorship selection will be completed by April 15.

# More Info About 2023–2024 Membership Dues Increase

In the January newsletter, we shared information about the Board's proposal to raise branch dues by \$8 per year starting with the 2023–2024 year. Members will vote on the proposal at the Fund Tea on April 22. We just learned that AAUW National will also raise dues by \$5.

This year, your total annual dues were \$107. If the branch proposal is accepted, your dues next year will be \$120. AAUW National will get \$72 (\$67+\$5), AAUW CA receives \$20 (no change), and our branch will receive \$28 (\$20+\$8).

Why the Proposed Increase in Dues? Simply put, our revenues can't cover our expenses. During the pandemic, we used reserves because we were unable to hold the Art and Wind Festival Ice Cream sale, which is our major source of revenue. Although that event is back, our revenue (including dues) isn't enough. Our branch is frugal. We have enough money for basic operations, but events cost more because expenses for venues and guests have increased. Our programs introduce our branch to new people which, in turn, help us grow. Currently, we have one of the lowest branch dues in the nation. We have not raised branch dues for our branch in many years. While the \$8 doesn't fully cover the difference between our income and what we spend annually, it does reduce how much we must use from reserves.

**We Need Your Input.** Between now and the April 22<sup>nd</sup> vote, we invite you to come to the March Zoom board meeting at 7:00 PM on Monday, March 13 to provide comments or you can email Kathleen Schaub or Janice Colby at anytime.

We are both available to discuss this important decision with you individually.

Please be an active participant in this discussion. This decision doesn't come lightly. We want to ensure that all members have a voice in the decision.

# March Is Women's History Month, a Fitting Time to Observe Transgender Day of Visibility

Each year on March 31, the world observes Transgender Day of Visibility (TDOV) to raise awareness about transgender people. It is a day to celebrate the lives and contributions of trans people, while also drawing attention to the poverty, discrimination, and violence the community faces.

We understand how women's history tells the story of misogyny, which is the systemic mistreatment of women, girls, and feminine peoples through forms of physical and structural violence. But we rarely consider how it is linked to transmisogyny, which focuses on the complex intersections between transphobia and misogyny that are faced by trans women and girls, as well as transfeminine and gender non-conforming peoples. It is a term that attempts to capture multiple layers of gender-based marginalization and systemic mistreatment. If misogyny and transmisogyny are not combatted together, then the root of the problem will never truly be eradicated.

Although the past decade has seen a more vocal public push for diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives around gender, the current sociopolitical climate in the United States is not supportive of, and is often openly hostile to, transgender and gender non-conforming individuals. Under this sphere of increased hostility is the explicit targeting of trans women and girls and transfeminine peoples with words, actions, and legislation. It is particularly important for women's organizations who seek to combat gender-based forms of oppression to build coalitions and take a stand against misogyny and transmisogyny in all its forms, because misogyny and transmisogyny come from the same place. They both describe gender-based oppression that results from the prioritization of masculinity alongside the degradation of femininity.

Targeted hostility against trans women and girls and transfeminine peoples can be seen not only in the alarming uptick in physical violence against this community, but also in the increasing persistence and intensity of public debates over whether or not trans women and girls and transfeminine peoples are "real women" that belong in "women's spaces," including gender-specific bathrooms, women's sports teams, and locker rooms. These debates prioritize misplaced and misunderstood claims of biological authenticity. They are dehumanizing and cannot be disconnected from other forms of violence as they normalize widespread and explicit marginalization and exclusion.

[Given that AAUW is] a women's organization, the increasingly hostile environment for trans women and girls and transfeminine people should be at the forefront of our collective education and activism—let's help ensure that history doesn't continue to repeat itself. 
