#### **High School Scholarship Recipients**

The 2023 scholarship recipients have been selected! We have awarded \$1,000 scholarships to three outstanding young women from our two San Ramon high schools. This year's recipients present a wide range of skills and interests. They have demonstrated significant academic success and achievements in music, art, science, athletics, world languages, and leadership. They have also been involved in community volunteer or social activities, participated in internships, or held part-time jobs. We are confident that they will accomplish their academic and personal goals.



Anisha Gupta is from Dougherty Valley High School and will attend UC Santa Barbara in the fall. She plans to major in Psychology and aims for a career in this field, possibly as a psychiatrist. Anisha states that recent coursework in psychology and neuroscience has led to this career interest, along with personal experiences with friends and family of "burnout, stress, anxiety, and depression" during the recent shutdown. Anisha has been very involved with musical activities for all of her high school years, participating in several choral groups (women's ensemble, treble choir, concert choir, and chamber singers). She has also competed in racquetball tournaments, including the Junior National Olympic Championship. Additionally, she plays the piano, performs with an Indian Kathak classical dance group, enjoys baking "to relieve stress," and makes greeting cards using calligraphy. She has volunteered with CSF and Open Heart Kitchen and has worked part-time.





Mia Rabuco is from California High School and will attend Oregon State Universty in Corvallis, majoring in Sociology/Pre-Law with the goal of becoming a lawyer and an advocate for women and girls. Mia has demonstrated outstanding focus and leadership skills since middle school. #### San Ramon AAUW Awarded \$3,750 in Grants!

This year under the guidance of **Pamela Justin**, grant coordinator for Local Scholarship, our branch received generous grants totaling \$3,750 from businesses located throughout the Tri-Valley. Pam's diligent research and hard work helped us win these wonderful grants. These funds will go toward high school and Renaissance scholarships for 2023–2024. With these grants, Local Scholarship has reached their goal of \$10,000 for 2023.

Our branch received the following grants: \$250 from Smart and Final, \$500 from Costco, \$1,000 from Robert Half in San Ramon, and \$2,000 from the Tri-Valley Nonprofit Alliance in Livermore.

We are expressions of life, of creativity itself, meant to give, invent, bring forth, and heal. We're designed for that, and so we long for it. You can forget all the inner critic narratives and personal questions about your readiness to play bigger, because it's just not a personal matter. It's for all of us.

As we step into our authentic callings, we bring the sanity and compassion that our world so desperately needs.

It's true. You are called to bring forth what is in you.

#### **INTRODUCING GOV TREK 2023**

Gov Trek is an exciting new virtual program administered by AAUW California. It is designed to gain young women's interest in pursuing careers in public service and elected office. In its inaugural year, Gov Trek trained 40 young women leaders of tomorrow, and we are fortunate that Hailey Godin represented our San Ramon branch.

Gov Trek is for junior and senior high school girls throughout the state. They participated in five 2-hour Saturday sessions, learning from current and former legislators, staffers, and consultants from all over the country. The program was designed to help women prepare to run a political campaign via a team competition. Hailey was on Team Alaina, which won the Grand **Prize**. #### "It is a possibility for young women everywhere"

Hailey's comments: "For me, the program was exactly what I needed at precisely the right time. About a year ago I realized I wanted to pursue a career invested in human rights. What stood out most was the diversity of government positions represented by the speakers. I saw that I didn't have to limit myself to a specific career or major going into college as my path could wander elsewhere within the broad spectrum of government jobs. Of course, we got to hear of the hardships faced by women in a male-dominated field, but these were not sob stories, they were clearly a call to action. The program was truly amazing through its empowerment and its simplification of such a detailed process. I remember going into the campaign simulation concerned that I would have no idea how to do my part. However, the program laid out the process well and allowed for freedom and creativity which showed me just how realistic the process was. It is a possibility for young women everywhere. It is something that I can do if I so desire. The possibilities are endless, not just jobs, but also the passions supplied and supported by government and political positions as well. We need new ideas and fresh minds in politics. We need innovation and empowerment. We need more women in government."

#### **Public Policy**



Following is a synopsis of recently published reports regarding AAUW California's Legislative priorities and initiatives for 2023-2024. The text has been edited for brevity and clarity. We also include an uplifting and historically interesting celebration of Pride Month!

AAUW California State Public Policy Committee Sets 2023–24 Legislative Agenda by Kathi Harper, State Public Policy Chair; March 20, 2023

The State Public Policy Committee, in conjunction with our Public Policy Advocate Kathy Von Osten, has completed their selection of the 30 bills that the committee and Kathy will be prioritizing this year. These bills fall into the following categories from the Three Pillars of our **Public Policy Priorities:** 

- 8 "Economic Security"
- 11 "Public Education"
- 21 "Social Justice"
- 8 "reproductive justice"
- 5 "healthcare"
- 5 "freedom from violence" including sex exploitation, DV, stalking
- 1 "gender-identity protection"
- 2 "voting rights"

The committee then selected our top three priority bills, including at least one bill that we will co-sponsor: "A" bills. Efforts to promote these bills will involve working with the authors' offices, attending committing hearings, and writing letters of support. We then selected three nextlevel bills, or "B" bills, which are important but not as resource-intensive. The remaining 24 bills will be handled as "C" level bills. Here is a look at our top three bills:

**AB1394** – This is our co-sponsored bill. It would allow victims of child sexual exploitation and trafficking to sue a social media platform for between \$1 million and \$5 million if the victim can prove the platform design knowingly, recklessly, or negligently facilitated the use of code words for sexual predators to describe the type of child and the type of sexual activity that resulted in the act of exploitation.

SB287 – Would prohibit a social media platform from using a design, algorithm, or feature that the platform knows, or should know, causes child users to: purchase fentanyl; inflict harm on themselves or others; develop an eating disorder or engage in dangerous dieting; purposely Continued next page

take their own lives; and/or experience addiction to the social media platform. A victim of any of these consequences can sue the platform for up to \$250,000 for each violation.

**AB549** – Requires all state agencies to conduct an evaluation of all their departments to ensure the state does not discriminate against women, and report their findings every two years.

AAUW California Promotes its Priorities with the Legislature, Prepares for a Vote on New Ones by Ginny Hatfield, Amy Hom, and Kathi Harper, AAUW CA Public Policy Committee; April 1, 2023

If you participated in this year's Lobby Days on March 21st and 22nd, you know it was a whirlwind of activity. . . . While most meetings were conducted with legislative staff, we were able this year to schedule 10 meetings with the members themselves—6 Assemblymembers and 4 Senators. In addition, Kathi Harper, AAUW CA Public Policy Chair, and Kathy Van Osten, our AAUW CA Legislative Advocate, met with the Governor's staff and Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon's office. . . .

A sterling endorsement came from none other than Alf Brandt, Policy Consultant for Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon, whose mother was an AAUW member in the 1940s in Orange County. He credits her involvement in AAUW for "making me the man I am today."

There seemed to be a general consensus favoring our "Top 3" bills—AB 1394, SB 287, and AB 549—especially the two social media bills. Both staff and legislators could identify with the pervasive problem of having children who are or will be targeted by social media. AB 549 needed a bit more explaining, as some were unfamiliar with CEDAW, the Convention on the Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination Against Women. During our Lobby Days event, we were able to get our message across to those who make our laws and to highlight AAUW, our mission, accomplishments and the benefits we bring to our communities throughout California. It was an empowering exercise in advocacy and for those of you who participated, AAUW CA thanks you!

As to the Public Policy Priorities for 2023–25, and in response to input from 466 members, the state Public

Highlighted additions include support for: civics education, access to diverse staff and curriculum, safe infrastructure and access to technology in our schools, gun violence prevention, and a fourth pillar to support women in leadership roles.

*Happy Pride Month!* by Kim Talbert, AAUW California Public Policy Committee; May 5, 2023

Every June since 1970, Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Queer or Questioning (LGBTQ+) Pride Month is celebrated to honor the 1969 Stonewall Uprising in Manhattan. At the time, The Stonewall Inn was the most popular gay bar in Manhattan. Until 1966 it was illegal to serve alcohol to a gay person, and until 1969, homosexuality was a criminal offense. On the morning of June 28, 1969, police raided the bar for the sale of illegal alcohol. . . . [T]housands of protestors came out, and the protests lasted for six days. These protests sparked the beginning of the Gay Liberation Movement.

The Stonewall Inn is now a National Monument. In 2016, President Obama established the first LGBTQ+ National Park in the 7.7 acres surrounding The Stonewall Inn, and in 2019, the city of New York honored LGBTQ+ activists Marsha P. Johnson and Sylvia Rivera, with a statue for their activism. They were prominent in the Stonewall Uprising, and according to the city of New York, this was the "first permanent, public artwork recognizing transgender women in the world."

Since the Stonewall Uprising, there have been many significant advances for the LGBTQ+ community, like same-sex marriage and the passage of the Matthew Shepard and James Byrd Hate Crimes Prevention Act of 2009. There is still a long way to go for equitable treatment for all, but that's why it's exciting to work with an organization like AAUW on its mission of achieving a more equitable society.
