President's Pen



Happy National Volunteer Month

Volunteers do not necessarily have the time; they just have the heart.

You may have heard of <u>Blue Zones</u>, the communities around the world with especially healthy, long-lived people. One finding from studies of Blue Zones is that these people have more language for "purpose." I like this <u>definition of "purpose" from Greater Good</u>: "*Purpose is* an abiding intention to achieve a long-term goal that is both personally meaningful and makes a positive mark on the world."

Volunteering is one way that people create purpose in life. In April we celebrate National Volunteer Month. President Richard Nixon established a weeklong celebration of



everyday heroes in 1974. President George Bush extended it to a month with his 1000 Points of Light campaign, and National Volunteer Month has been mandated by the president each April since 1990.

Volunteering reduces stress by releasing dopamine, which makes you feel good. One example comes from an interview with a young journalist that I listened to. During the pandemic, the woman tended to become, like so many of us, panicky about COVID, the climate emergency, the political tumult, and race relations, as well as her own private troubles. In the interview, she shared how she had found the antidote for her depression. A wise elder had advised her to take just one small action to help someone whenever the young woman spun with anxiety. The journalist reported it was like a miracle. Hope sparked in her with each tiny act—petting a dog, giving \$25 to a gofund-me campaign, or doing an errand for a neighbor.

If you are in a terrible state, you are better off helping someone than eating a Snickers bar or having a glass of wine. <u>Research has shown</u> that for those 60 and older, volunteers report better health than non-volunteers. Volunteering leads to a reduction in the risk of heart disease, stroke, and general illness.

Volunteering is the American way! When you volunteer, you join <u>60.7 million Americans</u> (23.3% of the population) who formally volunteer (e.g., being an AAUW board or committee member, working at an AAUW fundraiser, donating to AAUW) and an estimated 124.7 million more who informally volunteer (e.g., watching kids, helping neighbors, teaching others about important issues). Volunteers gave an estimated 4.1 billion hours of service in the year September 2020–September 2021 valued at nearly \$123 billion in economic value!

To kick off this important month, lift your spirits with this rendition of my elementary school song, "It is better to light just one little candle." It was a Perry Como hit in the 1950s, and <u>a chorus of children sang it</u> on an album from the band Chicago.

On behalf of all the girls and women (including yourselves!) you have helped this year, I sincerely thank you for your volunteering. May you always relish the joy of purpose in your life. Happy National Volunteer Month!

Gov Trek



San Ramon Valley Students on Prize-Winning Team

Six San Ramon Valley USD junior and senior girls participated in the AAUW California Gov Trek 2024 program, which started on February 3 and concluded March 16. Gov Trek is a virtual program designed to encourage the next generation to pursue careers in public service and elected office. The program is free to participants and is limited to 140 girls each year. (More information about Gov Trek is available on the AAUW California website: <u>AAUW-CA.org</u>.)

Sessions were held from 10:00 to 2:00 on Saturday mornings and included speeches from many California women leaders, such as US Representative Zoe Lofgren, a candidate for city manager in San Diego, and elected school board members. All encouraged the participating students to involve themselves in local, state, and national government. These students spent three weeks preparing a campaign video presentation, which was judged on March 16.

Five of our students were able to finish the program: three from California High School, and one each from Dougherty Valley and Monte Vista High Schools. They all credited school and teacher support for their decisions to enter the program, and indicated interest in STEM and equity issues.

Four of these students were on Team Eliana, the Grand Prize Winner! All five of these girls are now eligible for internships this summer through the state Gov Trek Program. Everyone can watch the final videos, which are posted on the state Gov Trek site at <u>https://www.aauwca.org/gov-trek/</u>

We can all be proud of these girls' accomplishments. These are our future female leaders.

Celebrate Mother Earth Day

International Mother Earth Day was established in 2009, by the United Nations <u>General Assembly</u> under Resolution A/RES/63/278. The resolution was introduced by <u>The Plurinational State of Bolivia</u> and endorsed by over 50 member states. It recognizes that "the Earth and its ecosystems are our home" and that "it is necessary to promote harmony with nature and the Earth." The term Mother Earth is used because it "reflects the inter-dependence that exists among human beings, other living species and the planet we all inhabit." It is decided to designate April 22 as International Mother Earth Day.

General Assembly President <u>Miguel d'Escoto</u> <u>Brockmann</u> welcomed the creation of International Mother Earth Day, saying: "International Mother Earth Day promotes a view of the Earth as the entity that sustains all living things found in nature. Inclusiveness is at the heart of International Mother Earth Day; fostering shared responsibilities to rebuild our troubled relationship

with nature is a cause that is uniting people around the world. *Source*: https://www.aauw-ca.org/event/international-mother-earth-day/
