#### A Summer of Transition

She realized what a gate was: it was an indication that you had left one place and were entering another.

Summer can be many things: a longed-for vacation, time to read a juicy romance, tending to gardens at the height of their glory, running kids back and forth to a plethora of camps, scrumptious backyard barbecues, or a break from AAUW board meetings (LOL). For me, summer will always feel like a time of transition because my brain remains in school mode. I loved school, and my mental year has always ended in June and restarted in September with summer as a liminal time.

I learned the word *liminal* a while back, and it has become one of my favorite words. It's an adjective indicating a threshold between two states. Airports, parking lots, hotel lobbies, the surf, and doorways are liminal places. Twilight and dawn are liminal times. When you feel like you are the verge of something, you are experiencing a liminal moment. Some years the summer liminal period was passing from one grade to another, while sometimes there was big shift from one life stage to another through the ritual of graduation.

Besides graduations, many of us hold some of life's most significant transitions in common including marriage, parenthood, career shifts, divorce, moving, empty nest, retirement, and deaths. Other gates are personal, such as the achievement of a treasured goal or a discovery of a hidden family secret. Still other transitions are experienced by all of us but not in the same way—right now, the diffusion of artificial intelligence into our information system comes to mind. We will always have a before and after this big change.

Some transitions are unexpected, but often we can see the new state looming on the horizon, which gives us a liminal opportunity to "train" for the new state. A friend of mine is making the most of her liminal time as she prepares for knee surgery. Her training consists of becoming as physically strong as she can get: exercise, losing weight, cutting down drinking. She is also preparing her home for a period of decreased mobility and building her network of people who can help. Training for a new state we know is coming improves the chances that life will roll in our direction.

Is there a transition on the horizon for you? How could you make this summer a time to train? For me this summer, it's moving into a new home and starting the publishing process for the book I've been working on for several years (I learned it takes like a year to get published!). Also, I'll be stepping down from AAUW San Ramon board after four fun and challenging years (one as president elect, two as co-president with the amazing Janice Colby, and one more as president). I'm thinking a lot about how to train well for these big changes during this liminal time.

In the September newsletter, you'll get a President's Pen from our two awesome incoming co-presidents, Cindy Alpert and Judy Bracken. I look forward to seeing what these two talented women have in store for us! We will all find out at the September 7<sup>th</sup> kickoff event.

Here's to a wonderful summer and whatever is next for you. May it bring you many blessings and enlightening adventures!

**POSTSCRIPT:** Regretfully, I must share that the change to the National bylaws to open membership qualification did not pass. Changes to AAUW's bylaws require 2/3 majority (66.6%) to pass, and AAUW members voted 65.1% to approve the measure—missing by just 1.5%. Hopefully, it will pass next time.

## MEET OUR HIGH SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS

The 2024 scholarship recipients have been selected! We have awarded \$1,000 scholarships to four outstanding young women from California High School. This year's recipients present a wide range of skills and have demonstrated significant academic success and achievements in music, science, world languages, athletics, and leadership. They have been involved in community volunteer or social activities, participated in internships, or held part-time jobs. We hope that many of you had a chance to meet and speak with them at our Year-End Celebration on May 18. Following is a brief overview of their accomplishments and goals.



Hailey Godin will attend Muhlenberg College in Allentown, Pennsylvania to major in Sociology and Political Science and to attend law school. She is focused on a career in public service. Throughout her high school career, Hailey demonstrated her passion for social justice and equity. She founded the Restorative Justice Club at Cal High, initiated a joint Restorative Coalition with all four high schools in SRVUSD, and has been a member of the district's Equity Steering Committee. Her leadership skills are also evidenced on the softball field. She has participated in this sport since was 10 years old, on school and traveling teams. She has been a varsity softball team member at Cal High for all 4 years, currently is the team captain, and will continue playing in college at Muhlenberg. Hailey was a Tech Trek camper from our organization in middle school and a winner in last year's Gov Trek program.

#### **Local Scholarship**



Shivali Pathak will attend the University of California in Irvine. She plans to major in Public Health and become a physician. During her high school years, Shivali has demonstrated her commitment to both STEM areas and community service. On campus, Shivali has been a member of NHS, served as president of the Red Cross club, and founded the STEMpower club. STEMpower organized high school volunteers to provide hands-on science workshops to elementary students both in San Ramon and Oakland. They also donated necessary science equipment to some of the needy Oakland schools. At this time, Shivali was also an intern at a biotech company doing cancer research. Shivali has also been involved in both vocal and dance musical activities for many years, both on campus and in other areas. In 2020, she founded an organization to address the "pandemic-induced isolation" called Tri-Valley Youth Music Group (TVYMG). This group of high school musicians performed for hospitals, senior centers, and other groups and raised money for the Red Cross and a domestic violence support group.



<u>Trisha Sarkar</u> will attend Colby College in Waterville, Maine. She plans to major in Business with a career goal of working in finance. Trisha has demonstrated her leadership skills with her involvement with several campus organizations. She has been a member or Interact for four years (currently serving as its president) and is the managing editor of the school newspaper. She has been a varsity lacrosse team member at Cal High for all 4 years, currently is the team captain, and will continue playing at

Colby. She has played on club lacrosse teams and has been employed as an individual tutor, referee, and coach. Following her freshman year, she co-founded the Summer of Pages Book Club for fourth to seventh graders in the Tri-Valley area, focusing on developing reading comprehension. Over the past three summers, more than 300 students have been involved with this group in collaboration with local librarians, authors, and teachers. Trisha's other volunteer activities have included the National Alopecia Areta Foundation (NAAF), as Trisha was diagnosed at age three with this condition, and Junior Achievement, which focuses on promoting financial literacy and business entrepreneurship.



Nadia Sherman will attend East Tennessee State University in Johnson City, Tennessee. She plans to major in Nursing with a career goal of working with neonatal or oncology patients. Nadia states that one of her greatest strengths is her "ability to show kindness toward others." She demonstrated this strength and made an immediate impression at the beginning of her sophomore year when she began volunteering in a Special Day Class as part of the Best Buddies Club. She realized that many on-campus and community activities were not available to many SPED students. As current president of Best Buddies, copresident of the Special Olympic Club, and member of the PALS program, she has provided leadership and organized many opportunities for SPED students at Cal High. These included tutoring and individual support, organizing a special "prom" and on-campus Special Olympics events, as well as developing individual friendships with general education students. Nadia has demonstrated caring skills in the community as a member of St. Raymond's parish as a respite caregiver and, along with her family, as a resource family for foster children. She has continued to play competitive soccer for 14 years and more recently flag football—along with maintaining a part-time job.

#### **Membership Renewal**

AAUW National emailed renewal reminders on April 25, 2024 to everyone whose membership expires on June 30, 2024. The email was sent from American Association of University Women, infosf@aauw.org. The subject line reads: "AAUW: It's Time to Renew Your Membership!"

Check your spam folder if you did not get this email. You will be getting a reminder notice in June from AAUW National. You are encouraged to complete your renewal online. The video on how to self-renew is helpful. Our branch code is CA0189.

The preferred method of payment is by credit card when you renew online. However, you may also pay by check to AAUW San Ramon, P.O. Box 336, San Ramon, CA 94583. Dues for 2024–2025 remain unchanged: AAUW National \$72 (fully tax deductible) + AAUW California \$20 + AAUW San Ramon \$28 = a total of \$120.

Honorary (50-year) members do not pay dues. Lifetime members have prepaid national dues, thus pay only state and branch dues. Dual members pay dues for each branch to which they belong and the corresponding state dues as well as national dues unless they are lifetime members.

## **AAUW California Advocates for Its Priorities with the Legislature**

This year's Lobby Days event, held on April 2nd and 3rd, was exciting and action-packed. 140 women on 43 teams from 63 AAUW California branches met with 39 Assembly offices and 27 Senate offices. 11 meetings took place in person in Sacramento, 55 meetings took place via Zoom, and the majority took place without a hitch. While most meetings were conducted with legislative staff, we were able to hold eight meetings with the members themselves - five Assemblymembers and three Senators. We were not able to get a meeting for Zoom Team 7 with Assemblymember Hart, but they did even better when one of their members, Judy Frost from the Santa Maria branch, joined Assemblymember Hart on a hike and lobbied him on the hiking trail.

We were happy to learn that our organization was known to many of the legislative staff and legislators with whom our members met. Some staff had looked up our website prior to meeting and were impressed with programs such as Tech Trek and Gov Trek. Most were supportive of advancing women's equity. The reception of our "Top 3" bills - AB 2843, AB 2326 and AB 2099 – was generally favorable. The offices were more familiar with the first two, both of which are sponsored by AAUW California. AB 2099 was new to them. You can find more information on these and all the bills we are supporting HERE.

In short, AB 2843 eliminates cost sharing, including deductibles, from being imposed on any rape survivor seeking medical treatment following a rape. Insurers will be required to cover the full cost of medical care. AB 2326 requires the chancellors or presidents from the University of California (UC), the California State University (CSU), and the California Community Colleges, to provide an annual report publicly and orally to the Assembly and Senate Subcommittees on Education Finance on each institution's compliance with Title IX, including sexual assault. AB 2099 would make it possible for the D.A. to file a felony charge for sharing personal information or images of reproductive health care providers or patients, including on the internet, with the intent of causing them harm, if the posting and subsequent action results in bodily injury.

During our Lobby Days event, we were able to get our message across to those who make our laws and to highlight AAUW, our mission, accomplishments and the benefits we bring to our communities throughout California. It was an empowering exercise in advocacy and for those of you who participated, AAUW California thanks you!

### Biden Administration Releases Long-Awaited Guidance: NEW TITLE IX RULES

On Friday, April 19, 2024, the Biden Administration released long-awaited guidance on the application and administration of Title IX. The rule changes rework Trump Administration guidance on the handling of campus sexual assault, providing expanded protections for survivors; and expands Title IX protections against sex/gender-based harassment and discrimination to protect members of the LGBTQ+ community. Expansion of rights to the LGBTQ+ community via Title IX aligns this federal law with current interpretation of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act, which prohibits workplace discrimination on the basis of sex/gender. AAUW national serves in a gender equity coalition supporting these changes. Stay Tuned! It will be a busy summer. We are anticipating needing your help to push back on challenges to this new guidance. The June Public Policy News will include an article that expands on all of this information, and provides updates on impending legal challenges. Thank you in advance!
