Amy Hom and Missy Maceyko, heading up the AAUW California Public Policy Committee, stated in a webinar that “the objectives of Project 2025 directly counter the Public Policy Priorities of AAUW California. With federal policy pronouncements and changes continuing to take place at a head spinning pace, it is clear that changes are underway to make Project 2025 become reality.” **So now is the time to take serious action!** They have put together a new **Take Action** spreadsheet, “a clearinghouse for ongoing resistance activity that people can follow and join-in based on their passions and preferences.” Because there are so many issues to grapple with, also included is a short list of monthly targeted action items. April focuses on learning about the SAVE Act and easy ways to reach out to state and federal legislators. If you think about all the different branches in California: Danville, San Jose, Healdsburg, Los Angeles, Sacramento and beyond, all reaching out to take action, the effect can be immense. Empowering Young Women with Self-eSTEM

AAUW Community FUND Grant Recipient Adamaka Ajalo educated the group with her engaging presentation about Self-eSTEM on Thursday, April 17. Self-eSTEM is her brainchild: she has worked for various tech companies and experienced the "glass ceiling" prevalent in the corporate world. She understood that she never had access to the skills and support networks that would help her be successful in her tech career. Adamaka took that experience and created Self-eSTEM to help young women learn skills to join the tech world.

Adamaka's presentation was both informative and fun!

She explained that only 5 percent of STEM professionals are underrepresented women. For every 12 women who graduate with a STEM degree, only 5 are working in STEM after two years. After ten years, that number drops to 2.

Self-eSTEM provides a structured program in a curriculum designed to teach hands-on methods while providing career and mentorship pathways for girls from middle school through graduate school. Self-eSTEM also provides a community and support system, which includes help from leaders and the founder.

One component Adamaka likes to stress to the participants is that it's important to bring their creativity to the table. In her words: "Creativity is the new currency."

Our branch (in conjunction with the Danville/Alamo/Walnut Creek and Livermore/Pleasanton/Dublin branches) learned how doors to STEM education are being opened—or NOT being opened—for young women of color and how Self-eSTEM works to bridge the divide.



April is the month AAUW National (April 14th–May 13th) and AAUW California (April 26th–May 16th) kick off voting on various issues, bylaws, and board positions. Public Policy, Governance, and the nominating chair have been sending information since January and asking for input and candidates.

Now comes the time for members to make their voices heard when accepting, rejecting, or selecting ballot initiatives and candidates. We have a contested election for AAUW California Director positions, whereby you may select two choices from four candidates (read the candidate bios [HERE](#)), a [dues increase measure](#), and proposed [Public Policy Priorities](#), making your vote even more important.

All members with email addresses will receive their ballots electronically, and those without will receive their ballots in the US Mail to be returned by the closing dates.

Why bring this up? While a repairman was working near us, we were discussing an election result we were not happy about and the repairman said: “You are so lucky here, there will be another election at a scheduled time and you may work for a better outcome; in Moscow nothing has changed in 25 years with no end in sight!”
